

## **Qasr Garden Museum:** Living history of Tehran







Qasr Garden Museum occupies two former prisons, one of which was for criminals and the other for political prisoners.

The architects have done a great job on the historic site, placing quirky and contemporary artworks in its cells and around the landscaped garden, lonelyplanet.com reported.

Qasr means 'castle'. During all of the 19th century there was a royal palace there, but it eventually ran to ruin. In the early 20th century, a prison, designed by the Russian architect Nikolai Markov to meet international standards, was constructed and it is this building that forms the first part of the museum. Lawrence of Arabia was held in Qasr

Prison for a short time, which accounts for the cut-outs of his image in one cell. A second complex was where political prisoners were housed during the time of the last Pahlavi king. This was the first prison liberated during the Islamic Revolution.

The museum garden is a part of the over 200-year history of Tehran; it was located outside the city limits when it was built. With regard to the political changes that have taken place during this period, and the new requirements of the city, the monument was turned into a prison. Years of serving as a prison had left a sad and dreary image of the garden in the collective mind. The existing buildings, which used to be frightening prisons, are now calming, relaxing and beautiful galleries, libraries, amphitheatre, cafés and restaurants, which not only attract local citizens but people from every part of the world.

Besides its historic value, the site is a wonderful sample of a Persian garden. Converting the dark prison into a green and bright garden museum was an attempt to revive this heritage.

After the public opening of the collection, it encountered a stunning reception by the people.
